
TEXAS CITY READS 2014: QUIET MAKES A BIG NOISE

o you enjoy solitude? Do you tend to think before you speak? Do you avoid conflict? If you answered yes to any these questions, you might be an introvert. Don't worry! It's not an insult. At least, it shouldn't be. That's the argument of our new Texas City Reads book, *Quiet: The Power of Introverts in a World That Can't Stop Talking* by Susan Cain.

Introverts are often thought of as painfully shy, socially awkward, and poor leaders, but *Quiet* makes the compelling argument that introverts can excel in leadership, social situations, and anywhere else that extroverts thrive. Introverts aren't worse at these skills than extroverts, Cain claims, just *different*. She uses wonderful stories from her own life, interviews, and the latest science to make her case.

The book's strength is that it isn't just a defense of introverts and it is never an attack on extroverts. Cain takes her time to look at the best and worst elements of both personality types. No matter whether you are an introvert, extrovert, or somewhere inbetween, you'll learn a lot from *Quiet*. Cain explores

how introverts can help businesses avoid unnecessary and costly risks. She looks at the best way to help introverts succeed in education, business, and socially in a country that values extroversion so highly. If you are an introvert, you'll learn that you are not alone and



that you are in excellent company. If you're an extrovert you'll learn how to better understand and communicate with the introverts in your life.

We'll look at all the issues the book explores at a book discussion in the library meeting room on **Tues-day**, **September 23rd at 6:30 PM**.

restored 8,400-pound, Civil Warera cannon from the *U.S.S. West*field has come to the Texas City Museum. It is an amazing piece of Gulf Coast history that should be appreciated by all Texas Citians.

The *U.S.S. Westfield*, a refurbished Staten Island ferry, was the flagship of the Union fleet that controlled Galveston harbor from October 4, 1862, to January 1, 1863. This fleet was

part of the Union blockade designed to isolate the Confederate states and cut off Southern trade.

The ship was part of a heated battle with Confederate gunboats, soldiers, and cannons. During the battle, a Confederate ship rammed and boarded another Union vessel, the *U.S.S. Harriet*, and called for a surrender of

Union ships. Union Commander William Renshaw ordered his remaining vessels to leave the harbor rather than surrender, and had explosives set to scuttle the immobile Westfield. Tragically, the resulting explosion not only destroyed the Westfield, but also killed Renshaw and some of his men. You can read more about the battle and a lot more about Texas City History at our

PANCHO VILLA AND TEXAS CITY

r. Manuel Urbina II, former history professor at the College of the Mainland and Pancho Villa scholar, will give an address **Thursday, October 30, 2014, at 2:00 PM**, at Moore Memorial Public Library. The topic will be "Pancho Villa and the Mexican Revolution – the Texas City Connection".

Dr. Urbina will detail the little known connection between the man who went from bandit to revolutionary to legend and our own city.

Dr. Urbina has a long and illustrious history at the College of the Mainland, where he founded the Cinco de Mayo Festival in 1973, to help promote awareness of

the college's Hispanic community and Texas' unique multicultural heritage. He is the author of the book *The Impact of the Texas Revolution on the Government, Politics & Society of Mexico,* 1836-46, published in 1976 by the University of Texas. Dr. Urbina has also sponsored a 1988 reunion of soldiers who

rode with Pancho Villa, and his presentation will include a video of that historic reunion.


partment at (409) 643-5983. Storytime will not be held during the weeks of Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's.
