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KATRINA EVACUEES WELCOMED

Moore Memorial Library staff helped many evacuees from the Gulf Coast obtain critical information and Internet access during the recent evacuation and recovery efforts caused by Hurricane Katrina. The new computer workstations the library received during the last few months were in almost constant use as evacuees filed for Fed-

eral assistance, searched for missing family members, checked on homes and neighborhoods and looked for information on temporary housing, jobs and school registration. Library reference staff provided extensive individual assistance and offered full in-house services to evacuees. Library staff and the Friends of the Library also donated free reading materials and free copying and




printing access to evacuees. Evacuees settling in Texas may also obtain a free library card with verification of temporary residence.

OUTREACH SERVICE AT THE NESSLER CENTER PRESCHOOL



The Library has begun providing an outreach service to the children at the City's Nessler Center Preschool. Once a month a staff person from the library children's department brings an assortment of books, fingerplays, action rhymes, songs, and crafts to share. The first few

themes center around the Fall season and several early childhood concepts are incorporated in the program. This is a joint effort between the Library and Recreation and Tourism Department to provide exposure to quality children's literature and early literacy skills.

INFANTASTIC AND TODDLERIFIC – NEW CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

The Library has begun an Infantastic and Toddlerific program aimed at very young children, from birth to age 2. This program is held in the Walter Holland meeting room at the library on Thursday mornings at 10:00 a.m. The Infantastic and Toddlerific Program began on September 15, 2005 and ends November 17,

2005. This is a language-based program which features rhymes, stories, games, songs, and fingerplays. Included in each session are plenty of bouncy time rhymes, tickle times, clapping fun, rock 'n rhythm action rhymes and more. The youngest children are exposed to rhymes, rhythm, rich vocabulary, baby sign language, and simple sto-

ries. This is an effort to introduce these early learners to early literacy skills, which will help provide a foundation for eventually learning to read.

Assistant Library Director CarolAnn Mills hosts a library program for seniors at the Ashton Park Care Center.


