Think of obooko as a showcase or shop window for new and established independent writers. Our primary ebook file type is PDF because this is the most versatile format and one of the most efficient ways of distributing books. However, PDFs don't work too well with handheld eReading devices; with this in mind we are gradually introducing ePub and mobi (Kindle) formats." (from their website) You will need to login each time with a username and password, and you can create these by clicking on the "Join Free!" button on the main page.

"Book Search works just like web search. Try a search on Google Books or on Google.com. When we find a book with content that contains a match for your search terms, we'll link to it in your search results. If the book is out of copyright, or the publisher has given us permission, you'll be able to see a preview of the book, and in some cases the entire text. If it's in the public domain, you're free to download a PDF copy. If you find a book you like, click on the "Buy this book" and "Borrow this book" links to see where you can buy or borrow the print book. You can now also buy the ebook from the Google Play Store." (from their website) Google Books is where you can look at a preview of a book or read the whole thing (if it is in the public domain). In order to download the free books, you have to set up a Google account, and it will be moved into a "My Books" account in the Google Play Store. You can also purchase e-books (the price will be in red on the left side above the book's information, and then you will need to put in your payment information, such as a credit card).

Amazon

Amazon.com has a lot of free e-books to choose from, but you will need to set up an account with Amazon, even if you never intend to buy

anything from them, with a credit card or bank account. You will also need to own a Kindle or have the Kindle app downloaded into your computer to read Kindle books. You can find the free e-books by typing "free e-books" into the search bar at the top of the page .

Barnes and Noble

Just as you can on Amazon, you can find thousands of free e-books on Barnes and Noble's website. However, just like Amazon, you have to set up an account with a credit card, even if you never intend to purchase anything. The books are automatically downloaded onto a NOOK, if you own one (your Barnes and Noble account is connected to your NOOK), or you can download the NOOK app to read them on your computer. You will not be able to read these books on a Kindle, though, unless you have them converted into the Kindle format. To find the free e-books, click on "NOOK Books" then type "free" into the search bar.

Gutenberg.org offers over 42,000 free e-books, mostly from those that are in the public domain. Books can be read online in HTML or downloaded onto different devices (the EPUB downloads into Adobe Digital Editions the Kindle downloads into the Kindle app).

"The Internet Archive purposes include offering access for people to historical collections that exist in digital format. Browse and read over 5 million books and items from over 1,500-curated collections. You will find a wide range of literature, historical texts and research materials; and wonderful thematic collections like Children's Classics, Cookbooks and Genealogy." (from their website) You will have a few choices in the "View the Book" section on the item's page. You can read it online on the main page, from the original site, or download it to a device. Just like Gutenberg.org you can click on EPUB, and the item will open up in Adobe Digital Editions, the Kindle into the Kindle App.

the works, but downloading is not available, unless you are a member of one of the partner institutions. You can, however, create a "friend" account that will allow you to create your own "collections" of information/articles/text... for easier future access

Baen Free Library

Anyone who wishes can read these titles online — no conditions, no strings attached. You can download the books in one of several formats. Again, with no conditions or strings attached. You click on the "download" button next to the title, then a page opens that will give you several options on how to read the book.

Internet Archive website). You can get an OpenLibrary "card" by clicking on the "Sign Up" link at the top on the right. You will then be emailed for verification, and then you can start "borrowing" books (as you would do with the e-books from our library). You can borrow up to five books at a time for two weeks each. If the book is "checked out," you can be put on the waiting list to check it out later.
